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From the Desk of Pastor Kathy:

The Presence of God in Simultaneous Ways

Dear Friends in Christ,

We find ourselves amid difficult times as we navigate the realities of the Coronavirus. What I have noticed more recently is the diverse ways people are impacted by the pandemic. There are the precautions that remain, even as businesses and other aspects of our community are opening. I agree with many of you who say, "I'm ready to be done with this." On the other hand, the threat of this virus lingers; healthcare providers see patients who have recently become sick with Covid-19. I think of how our older members and others who are more vulnerable to its impact. Some extended families are getting together and others cannot.

On June 28, we will begin to have worship in the sanctuary at 10:45. (We will continue to have our 9:00 Drive-In worship through July and August.) Our staff and congregational leaders have been hard at work planning for this change to provide an environment that is as safe as possible for all who enter our building. More details are provided in this newsletter. Here again, people are approaching these changes in a variety of ways. It is heartwarming for me to see the members of St. Matthew be sensitive to these differences.

In the past few months the uncertainties of our life together continue. We are not all of one mind. How we spend our time in the next weeks and months depend on the circumstances and thoughts of individuals and families. What vacations we take, or not take, what events we attend or not attend and even what errands we will do, or not do, are decisions that are up in the air for many. The way we are approaching such things reflects a basic understanding of faith. Martin Luther referred to the fact that we live simultaneously as saint and sinner; both at the same time. For example, we orient our lives to Jesus, the one who is both human and divine. We are guided by the Holy Scriptures which reveal both the law and the promise of our covenant with God.

The tradition of our faith shows how we come to understand who Christ is and how we live in relationship with God. It is a both/and way of being. I think this is important for us to recognize during the racial unrest in our country. The video that showed the death of George Floyd in the custody of the Minneapolis police sparked protests throughout the world. Most every one of us, I believe, would agree that George Floyd's death was unjust, heartless and unacceptable under any terms. Why it happened and what to do about it raises a multitude of responses that tend to rise up in conflict with one another. (Con't. next page)

There is much that I could say about systemic racism and its hold on us who live as white people. This conversation is as important as it is complicated. I hope you will consider joining the discussion of Joseph R. Barndt's book, *Understanding and Dismantling Racism*. There is more information on the Christian Education page of this newsletter.

My personal reflection on this has me looking for more opportunities to learn about the underlying realities of what is happening now and about what has happened in the past. I am also reflecting on the reality that the great majority of our police officers seek to act with integrity and justice. I have paid attention to the dangers our police face in their work. Here is when I am reminded of our both/and faith. We can be angry and protest against the violence of the police officers who target and kill black people. We can also be angry at the senseless deaths of police officers. We can support peaceful protests and at the same time speak against the riots and looting that happen.

I appreciate how Bishop Eaton concluded her sermon for Holy Trinity Sunday. It is posted on our website and Facebook page. This is what she said:

Let us stand with those peacefully protesting and acting responsibly. Looting and destruction of property does not further the cause of justice. Government has a role to uphold civil order while also a role to respect peaceful protest. There are those in law enforcement who are acting wisely, even while others have acted irresponsibly. I ask you to support the many people, including those in our church, who are working to de-escalate tensions between law enforcement, protesters and the community.

We are simultaneously saints and sinners and so we confess our sins, repent of our ways and live in the reality of God's forgiveness who embraces us all.



We are looking to involve others in the process, at least while we are in this period of transition. Currently, the services are recorded with a mobile phone and tablet and ultimately uploaded to the St. Matthew YouTube channel. Our digital microphones interface only with Apple devices, so that may be a limiting factor for volunteers. Please contact Doug if you are comfortable “shooting” video using an iPhone or iPad and are not threatened by YouTube. We look forward to hearing of your interest. Thanks for considering.

Our Drive-In Worship is planned to continue through the summer at 9:00 a.m. **Beginning June 28**, we will also have worship in the Nave at 10:45 a.m. There will be no 11:00 Drive-In Worship after June 21. This will, of course, depend on any changes in state safety regulations. If it is raining, we will cancel the Drive-In Worship service(s). A determination will be made by 7:00 a.m. and cancellation will be posted on our website, on WHTM Channel 27 and on our office telephone system, 717-637-7101. Below are our tentative guidelines for returning. These are subject to change and we will continue to keep every informed.

Guidelines for Returning to Indoor Worship

Masks will be required.

We ask that everyone practice social distancing (at least 6 feet, excluding households) when in the church building.

For those who are feeling ill, have compromised immune systems, or are at high risk, please continue to utilize our on-line worship opportunities for your safety and the safety of others.

All hymnals, pens, papers, etc. have been removed from the pew racks, and the cushions have been removed from the pews.

Everyone will enter through the elevator lobby doors and porte-co-chere doors. No one should park in the porte-co-chere. The area needs to be accessible for emergency vehicles to enter and exit.

Bulletins, communion cups and Ziploc baggies (for empty communion cups) will be handed out as people enter.

Seating will be as directed by the Ushers with social distancing being practiced (one household unit per pew or 2 individuals.) Pews will be marked for seating, with two empty pews between the seated rows.

Communion will be with the wafer and disposable communion cups in the pew. A Ziploc baggie will be supplied for disposal of the empty cups. A waste basket for the communion cup baggies will be placed at the exits.

There will be a basket at each entrance and exit for the offering.

The men's and women's bathrooms outside of Fellowship Hall will be available for use. Linda will be available to clean between uses.

Everyone will exit through the door they entered and as directed by the ushers. The ushers will release everyone a row at a time.

There will be no nursery care available.

Because experts have determined that singing can hasten the spread of the virus, the congregation will be invited to follow along with the hymns in silence or humming.

Guidelines for Ushers for Returning to Indoor Worship

Masks will be required.

We ask that everyone practice social distancing (at least 6 feet, excluding households) when in the church building.

Everyone will enter through the elevator lobby doors and porte-co-chere doors. No one should park in the porte-co-chere. The area needs to be accessible for emergency vehicles to enter and exit.

Seating will be as directed by the Ushers with social distancing being practiced (one household unit per pew or 2 individuals.) Pews will be marked for seating, with two empty pews between the seated rows.

For those entering through the elevator lobby doors: they will receive bulletins, communion cups and Ziploc baggies near the entrance. They will proceed into the Nave through the Sacristy door. An Usher will be located at the Sacristy door to direct the people towards an Usher who will stand at the pew to be filled. There will be two empty pews between each pew that is being used. We will have the pews that are being used, marked with a yellow tag hanging on the end. Couples and families will be allowed to sit together. Others will be seated 6 feet apart, which means only 2 people per pew (except for the families and couples.) If we fill the available pews in the Nave, then the ushers will move to the balcony and seat people in the marked pews with social distancing in the balcony. We will need an usher at the porte-co-chere and one located at the rear of the church for anyone who comes in from the porte-co-chere doors. Those people will enter the rear of the Nave and be directed to the Usher who is filling in the pews.

The men's and women's bathrooms outside of Fellowship Hall will be available for use. Linda will be available to clean between uses.

Be aware of the seating position of Emergency Response Persons in order to be able to summon them for telephone calls or for any emergency.

Communion will be with the wafer and disposable communion cups in the pew. A Ziploc baggie will be supplied for disposal of the empty cups and a trash can will be located at each exit for the communion cup trash.

Ushers will count the number of attendees, including the ministerial staff. Please fill out the usual form in the Ushers' room.

There will be a basket at each entrance and exit for the offering. Someone will be stationed at the baskets as everyone is leaving.

Everyone will exit through the door they entered and as directed by the ushers. The ushers will release everyone a row at a time.

We would like to have 4 ushers for each service. We ask that one or two ushers check the halls during the service to assist any visitors who come in during the service.
