PRELUDE

WELCOME

Pastor: Today we welcome you to our Blue Christmas service, a service that has been put together especially for those of us who are not feeling particularly merry and bright right now.

Despite all the decorations, cards, music playing in the stores, the concerts and parties and TV commercials who want us to believe that when we buy their products, we will feel better and our troubles and worries will somehow disappear, we still feel empty.

We hope that you'll find this a safe place to be transparent with yourself and with God, a safe place to admit that maybe you're not ok at the moment, that maybe what you're really feeling is sad, discouraged, or even angry. A place for you to be real with your struggles and your questions.

Those of us feeling a little blue at this time of year can feel edged out and forgotten as everyone else seems caught up in the mad frenzy of their own preparations and celebrations. We hope that as you look around this afternoon, and as you think about the Christmas message, you'll find comfort and hope in knowing that you are not alone.

PRAYER

Pastor: God of mercy and love, we gather here today as hurting people, bringing our pain, our sorrow and our confusion to

this safe space. Loving God, meet us in our darkness, and give us freedom to struggle together as we seek your presence. We ask for strength for today, courage for tomorrow and peace from the past.

LIGHT THE CHRIST CANDLE

SCRIPTURE *John 1:1-5* In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. ²He was in the beginning with God. ³All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being ⁴in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. ⁵The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

THE EMPTY CHAIR

Pastor: This empty chair represents those who won't be home for Christmas.

Perhaps a relationship has ended, perhaps the people we love will be far away, perhaps family relationships are strained, perhaps sickness or death and the threat of Covid has changed how things used to be...

LIGHT THE FIRST CANDLE

Pastor: We light this first candle to remember those we have loved and lost and those who are not able to be with us.

We pause to remember their names, their faces, their voices and the memories of them that we hold in our hearts.

[Silent reflection]

Pastor: We thank God for them and ask for God's comfort, and when we are feeling overcome with sadness, we ask for the peace that is greater than we can ever understand.

All: Lord hear our prayer.

LIGHT THE SECOND CANDLE

Pastor: The empty chair also represents the pain and sadness that can come from other events that enter our lives, uninvited and unwanted – leaving us reeling in pain and shock, unable to shake the feeling that it wasn't supposed to be like this.

So we light this candle to represent other losses that we find ourselves faced with.

The loss of health,
employment,
independence,
freedom,
the loss of confidence or security,
plans that did not work out,
hopes that ended in despair.

We pause now for you to tell the God who longs to bind up those who are broken-hearted, about some of the losses that you are feeling at this time.

[Silent reflection]

All: Lord hear our prayer.

LIGHT THE THIRD CANDLE

Pastor: This candle represents our courage: the courage to face our sadness, to share our feelings with others, our doubts and fears, our anger, frustration or depression, and to dare to hope in the depths of our pain.

We pause now for you to tell the God who longs to take you by the hand and say to you, “Do not fear, I will help you find hope and courage for another day.”

[Silent reflection]

All: Lord hear our prayer.

LIGHT THE FOURTH CANDLE

Pastor: We light this fourth candle to remember those who have supported us in our pain.

We pause to remember the prayers, the words of comfort and support, the acts of kindness from family and friends and those who stood with us in our time of need.

[Silent reflection]

Pastor: We thank you God for sending your Son Jesus so that we are never alone. And we thank you for sending others who are your hands and heart.

All: Amen.

FOCUS ON THE CHRIST CANDLE

Pastor: Standing here in the center of the candles that represent some of life's joy and pain, this Christ candle represents Jesus who has come to be Emmanuel, God with us, in the midst of it all.

Jesus who was born as a helpless baby – but who hears our cries and understands how weak and helpless we can feel.

Jesus the good shepherd, who knows our hearts and offers us healing and hope in the midst of our suffering, who came to help us understand just how much God loves us, who lived and died to restore our relationship with our Heavenly Father.

Jesus, who will reign as King over God's new creation, where there will be no more sickness or death or crying or pain for all eternity; who has given us his Holy Spirit to help, comfort and guide us as we seek to follow him here on earth and wait for his glorious return.

Pastor: The carol before us expresses the longing the Israelites felt as they waited for God to send the deliverer He had promised. As we sing together, you may remain seated and rest in God's healing presence.

SCRIPTURE: PSALM 139

Lord you have searched me out and known me.

You know my sitting down and my rising up. You discern my thoughts from afar.

You trace my journeys and my resting places and are acquainted with all my ways. Indeed, there is not a word on my lips, but you, O lord, know it altogether. You press upon me, behind and before and lay

your hand upon me. Such knowledge is too wonderful for me. It is so high that I cannot attain to it.

Where can I go then from your spirit? Where can I flee from your presence? If I climb up to heaven, you are there. If I make the grave my bed, you're there also. If I take the wings of the morning and dwell on the uttermost parts of the sea, even there your hand will lead me and your right hand hold me fast.

If I say, surely the darkness will cover me and the light around me turn to night, darkness is not dark to you. The night is as bright as the day. Darkness and light to you are both alike.

For you yourself created my inmost parts. You knit me together in my mother's womb. I will thank you because I am marvelously made. Your works are wonderful and I know it well. My body was not hidden from you while I was being made in secret and woven in the depths of the earth.

Your eyes beheld my unborn limbs, yet unfinished in the womb. All of them were written in your book. They were fashioned day by day when as yet there was none of them.

How deep I find your thoughts, O God, how great is the sum of them!

If I were to count them, they would be more in number than the sand. To count them all, my life span would need to be like yours... and when I come to the end, I am still with you.

LIGHTING OF INDIVIDUAL CANDLES
